Ohio's trees can be placed into one of three categories: alternate, opposite, or whorled In an alternate leaf and branch arrangement, there is one leaf or branch per plant node, and they alternate sides In an opposite leaf and branch arrangement, two leaves or branches arise from the same node on opposite sides of the stem
